Book Review

'Shaking Her Assets': A Comic **Look At A Young Entrepeneur**

Although we usually don't review books, I received an email from co-author Robin Epstein, who grew up in Gladwyne asking us to review her new book 'Shaking Her Assets' which she co-authored with Renee Kaplan.

Shaking Her Assets is definitely "chick-lit", aimed toward women ages 20-35. Those who will best appreciate the book's humor are women who have spent time on their own, working, moving on in jobs or relationships or who have attended a bridal shower uncomfortably knowing very few friends of the bride.

The book has a likeable heroine and is written in a breezy, colloquial style. Even at the heroine's darkest hours, she keeps a sense of humor. Here's an example of the writing style from the book's prologue. "I can hear people walking by. I can feel their pity, and I can smell their fear. If it can happen to me, it can happen to them. Ultimately, the most important question that remains is whether I should bother packing my three cartons of unused business cards.."

Although it's co-authored, the writing is surprisingly smooth, written in the first person as events in the life of Rachel Chambers. Rachel works an editor in New York City for a high-

With her life in shambles, she accepts the offer of free vodka gimlets from her college buddy, Ben. As a joke to cheer her up, he proposes a business venture that begins to take off, much to Rachel's surprise.

while finding herself as an entrepreneur. The art director at her temp job, Zach Stevenson, befriends Rachel and astheir friendship grows, she discovers he is an artist

Rachel's life. Although the book ended as I suspected it would, and without much sense of Rachel growing in any depth as a person as she succeeds, it was enjoyable light reading, perfect reading for the beach.
